OH HAIL! WHAT TO DO AFTER THE HAIL HITS OUR PLANTS!

We garden in Colorado! We know the heartbreak of the 5 or 10-minute storm that can undo 500 hours of hard work.

When hail strikes—what's a gardener to do?

- Wait a day or two. Let the sun shine and the anger subside. The damage will be easier to evaluate after some time has passed. This is a good time to work on a new margarita recipe!
- Remove debris that could encourage the onset of disease.
- Prune selectively. Remove broken stems and leaf parts. Even parts of leaves can be removed. Make angled cuts for a more natural look.
- Feed your plants with a gentle nitrogen fertilizer. We recommend <u>Age Old Grow</u> liquid fertilizer.
- Watch for insect infestations. Bad bugs tend to pick on weakened plants.
- Try <u>Fertilome Triple Action</u>, a blend of naturally occurring pesticides for your garden, or OMRI approved <u>Safer Insect Killing Soap</u>.
- Re-evaluate plant choice and positioning. Fine-leafed plants generally tolerate hail better than those with large leaves. Many natives are well-adapted to hail.
 Position plants prone to hail damage under trees or on an east facing wall or fence.
- Have a plentiful array of patio pots. Those that are spared can be moved into place while others recover.
- This is why God invented ANNUALS. They can be purchased in full-bloom-and put in areas that need instant color and give INSTANT gratification!
- Conclusion....Keep a hail-thy attitude, and say "What the hail-where are those margaritas?"

Twenty-nine Garden Club ladies journeyed down to Santa Fe for several fun-filled days the week of June 11 - 15. This was our second visit to Santa Fe and we stayed at the same lovely hotel – The Inn at the Alameda. Monday was our arrival day and we had the difficult problem of choosing from 37 restaurants contained in a hand-out provided by the Field Trip Committee for dinner. (Did you know that Santa Fe is considered the second best restaurant scene in the country after New York City?)

Tuesday morning we started the day with a guided tour of the Santa Fe Botanical Gardens on Museum Hill. The mission of the garden is to celebrate, cultivate and conserve the rich botanical heritage and biodiversity of the region. In addition to the multiple of plants, we all enjoyed the many sculptures of mammals, birds and reptiles created by sculptor, Dan Ostermiller, who is from Loveland, Colorado. The dynamic backdrop of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains with the changing light, moving clouds and desert plants, created the perfect environment for the huge sculptures.

After our tour, we walked over to the Museum Hill Café for lunch then visited one or more of the four world-class museums presenting the art, history and culture of the Native American Southwest, the Spanish colonial past and folk traditions from around the world. Back at the Inn for cocktail hour, we drew names to break up into smaller groups for dinner at several local restaurants.



On Wednesday, we drove about 30 minutes south of Santa Fe for a two-hour private tour of the Allan Houser Sculpture Garden complex. The 50-acre parcel of land in southern Santa Fe County is covered with juniper and yellow twig rabbit brush with extensive views in all directions. The Houser family built a group of studios and an extensive outdoor garden and gallery. Our guides presented an excellent tour of many of the 80 monumental works displayed among the junipers. It was an unforgettable experience.

After lunch we returned to the Inn and either

rested or shopped. Cocktail hour was followed by our usual drawing of names for small group dinners at local restaurants.

On Thursday, about half of the group returned to Colorado. The rest spent a free day in Santa Fe. We are all looking forward to our next Away Trip to Victoria, British Columbia. We hope you can join us!
